My dear Professor Cartailhac:

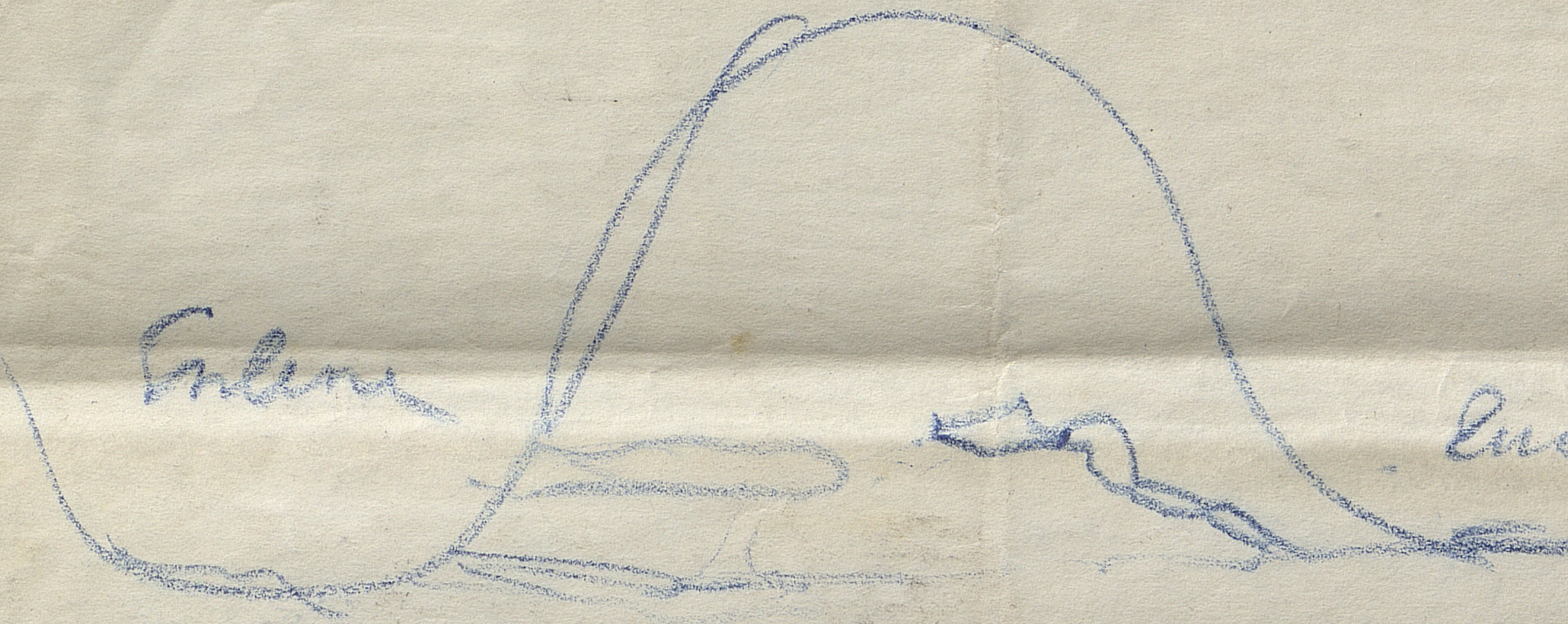
