Dear Sir,

I take the liberty of enclosing an introduction to you from our common friend Dr. Allen Sturge. We, i.e. my ^{beau-frère} brother-in-law and myself, are very anxious to see the painted caves as well as possible, in fact that is the object of our coming to France. ^{Je voudrais} Would it be troubling you too much to ask you to send a letter to me at the Hotel de Commerce at Perigueux to await my arrival, ^{disant} saying whether you will be in Toulouse about the 26th or 27th of this month and if so at what time you would allow me to call upon ^{vous} you. ^{peut-être si vous êtes non} Perhaps, if you are not going to be there yourself, ^{vous voudriez être avec moi pour m'en parler} you will be so good as to tell me to whom to apply in order to get all the information possible concerning the caves, I mean of course as to how to see them best. ^{le meilleur}

We are leaving here on the 20th and shall spend a couple of days in the Museum of St. Germain, after which we shall go to Perigueux. I have a letter of introduction to Monsieur Peyrony, but do not know if he will be there, but I suppose in any case it will be possible to gain access to the caves.
