I have received safely through Mr. Brownfield the jaw of the *Trogontherium*, and the teeth of *Hippopotamus*, and I regret that you have not succeeded in making the sections of the molar of the *Trogontherium* so satisfactorily as you could desire. I hope to obtain more specimens, and it will give me much pleasure to present them to you. I am much indebted to you and to Mr. Gaudry for the assistance you have rendered in identifying my specimens of deer's horns. I have obtained one from the upper part of the Forest-bed which I am desirous

to submit to you, and I propose
 to send a box directed to
 you at Pau Lacépède, and
 to take the liberty of inclosing
 for C^{de} de Saporta some of
 the soil of the most recent
 part of the Forest. bed
 containing leaves chiefly of
 the Willow (as it appears to me)

Mons^r Gaudry was so kind

 fir-trees, which I send through
 your Son.
