THE LATEST BATTLESHIP. THE FRENCH AERIAL FLEET.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.) PARIS, MAY 10. M. Gervais, who was reporter on the Army Estimates in the last Chamber, contributes to the *Matin* an article on the French aerial fleet.

THE LATEST BATTLESHIP. The battleship *Hercules*, sister ship to the *Colossus*, was launched yesterday from Palmer's Yard at Jarrow-on-Tyne.

THE FRENCH AERIAL FLEET. The French aerial fleet, according to the programme planned by the Minister of War, consists at the end of 1913 of 20 units—14 aerial cruisers with a minimum capacity of 8,000 cubic metres, and six scouts with a displacement of about 4,500 tons.

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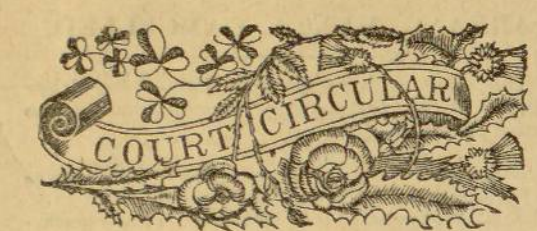
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QUEEN ALEXANDRA'S LETTER TO THE NATION.

Buckingham Palace, May 10. From the depth of my poor broken heart I wish to express to the whole Nation and our kind people we love so well my deepest thanks for all their touching sympathy in my overwhelming sorrow and unspeakable anguish.

Let me take this opportunity of expressing my heartfelt thanks for all the touching letters and tokens of sympathy I have received from all classes, high and low, rich and poor, which are so numerous that I fear it will be impossible for me ever to thank everybody individually.

I confide my dear Son into your care, who I know will give him in his dear Father's footsteps, being you to show him the same loyalty and devotion you showed his dear Father.

I know that both my dear Son and Daughter-in-law will do their utmost to merit and keep it.

KING GEORGE V. THE LATE KING.

The following message from the King to the Nation was issued last night:

Marlborough House, Pall Mall, S.W. It is my earnest wish on succeeding to the Throne to make known to the Nation how deeply grateful I am for its faithful and distinguished services rendered to me in the life of my beloved Father, who ever showed the greatest solicitude in his welfare and efficiency.

Educated and trained in that Profession which I love so dearly, retirement from active duty has in no sense diminished my feelings of affection for it. For thirty-three years I have had the honour of serving in the Navy, and such intimate participation in its life and work enables me to know how thoroughly I can depend upon that spirit of loyalty and zealous devotion to duty of which the glorious history of our Navy is the outcome.

That you will ever continue to be, in the past, the foremost defender of your Country's honour I know full well, and your fortunes will always be followed by me with deep feelings of pride and affectionate interest.

THE LATE KING. LYING-IN-STATE.

RECEPTION OF THE BODY.

LORDS AND COMMONS TO ASSEMBLE.

The arrangements connected with the funeral of his late Majesty King Edward are being carried out by the Earl Marshal (the Duke of Norfolk) in consultation with the Lord Great Chamberlain. His Majesty King George has signified his commands in the matter, and by last evening most of the details had been settled.

The arrangements for the lying-in-state will be found to be substantially as given in the Morning Post yesterday, but a unique feature not hitherto made public will be the reception of the body on its arrival in Westminster Hall by members of the two Houses of Parliament.

The hour at which the body of the dead King will be taken from Buckingham Palace to the House of Commons is still uncertain, but it will probably be early in the day.

As announced in our columns yesterday the public will gain access to Westminster Hall by St. Stephen's Entrance, and passing in double lines on either side of the tier will enter into the Palace Yard.

AUSTRALIAN COMMONWEALTH.

The Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia sent the following messages: "Will your Lordship be good enough to convey to their Majesties the King and Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and the Royal Family my respectful and deep sympathy in the terrible grief that has fallen upon them. I share to the fullest extent with every British citizen the feeling of intense sorrow at the death of so great a Sovereign and of a devoted master whom I, with others, have been privileged to represent. But great as the loss to the Empire, one's thought at such a time naturally turns with heartfelt sympathy to the Commonwealth of Australia, so great an overwhelming."

Ministers of the Commonwealth of Australia join me in expressing for the people of the Commonwealth the most sincere sympathy and condolence for the Majesties the King and Queen, Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, and the members of the Royal Family in the death of our great and peace-loving Sovereign, whose loss the whole British Empire mourns to-day."

CANADA.

The Governor-General of Canada telegraphed: "The announcement of the death of King Edward VII., who has just reached Canada, has created universal sorrow. His Majesty's Canadian Ministers desire that you will convey to his Majesty King George and the members of the Royal Family my respectful and deep sympathy in the great grief that has visited them. In the discharge of the duties of his exalted station his late Majesty not only with respect and devotion to his British subjects, but by his efforts in behalf of international harmony and goodwill he became universally esteemed as the Great Peacemaker.
